Nature of support 2016/17

- On-going development of a multi-professional 'Closing the Gaps' team to support teachers to maximise pupil attainment and progress through:
 - small group and 1:1 curricular support
 - preferable pupil / teacher ratio with 'quality first' teaching
 - improving attendance and punctuality using ACE / Family Learning Mentor
 - the provision of a lunchtime invitation club
 - supporting early speaking and listening skills (Wellcomm and Talk Boost)
 - supporting social and emotional wellbeing Emotional Therapy
 - working with key families CAF support staff
- Increasing parental involvement in their children's learning, e.g. Reading workshops and Come and Learn sessions.
- Parent Puzzle training and delivery to some families
- Money available to families for support with trips and a programme of trips to develop children's aspirations.

SENDCO	£8,893	Access to specialist support for learning and behaviour needs. For example, specific assessments to identify barriers to learning or providing self-esteem/anger management programmes which improve pupil behaviour and as a result accelerate progress.
Nurture provision	£19,779	Built children's personal and social skills and enhanced their approaches to learning
Family Learning Mentor	£18,526	Maintained supportive links with families and monitored and improved attendance.
Speech & Language Specialist	£9,480	Works with specific children with speech and language difficulties.

Ace Service Subscription	£728	An increased focus on poor attendance ensured families were supported and strategies were put into place.
Resource budget (Cool milk/uniform)	£921	Children were provided with resources that supported a positive self-image.
Training	£2,330	Staff were equipped with the skills to support all children appropriately.
Lunchtime Invitation Club	£2243	Children who may get into social difficulties had structured and well managed lunchtimes. This was evident from a huge reduction in referrals to thinking bay for poor behaviour.
After School Activities Co-ordinator	£4149	Provided extra-curricular opportunities that ensured a variety of different physical activities.
Nurture/Hideout refurbishment	£5214	Provided a safe and engaging space for lunchtime activities and curriculum enrichment.
Pupil premium review	£2000	A review of practice and strategy across the school allowed the best provision for pupil premium children to be implemented.
Achievement for All	£6700	Ensured a clear plan to ensure all children reach their full potential.
Sycamore counselling	£180	Allowed an independent outlet for a child experiencing emotional difficulties.
Curriculum enrichment and resources	£11,273	Resources and trips supported children in their social development, challenging themselves and developing their aspirations

Curriculum focus of PPG spending 2016/17

Before & After School Provision

Currently, approximately 48% of those children attending the after school learning centre are those in receipt of pupil premium funding. Overall 48% of pupil premium children attend the provision. In these cases teachers report that children are better prepared for the school day and are completing their homework on a regular basis which is leading to accelerated progress.

- > The total number of pupil premium children in the whole school was 119 children.
- The total number of children accessing E.C.A was 176 children.
- > The total number of pupil premium children accessing E.C.A was 54 children.

Counselling and Nurture Provision

62% of the children that have attended the Nurture provision are children in receipt of pupil premium funding and class teachers report that these children are better able to access their learning and as a result make better progress.

How the Impact of PPG spending will be measured

The progress of the pupils in receipt of the pupil premium grant is closely monitored by the Literacy and Numeracy subject leaders and by the Senior Leadership Team on a termly basis and reported to school Governors. Interventions are put into place to accelerate the progress of those children deemed to be making less than expected progress.

Spending has also been closely linked to pupil's individual needs over the past year. It is clear to see from results that focussed work with children and opportunities for enrichment have had a huge impact on results across KS1 and KS2.

The following graphs show the end of key stage results.

Phonics Screen

Our phonics screen result has been the highest ever at Goodyers End at 84%. Pupil premium children made good progress from their starting points.

Phonics 3-year Trend

In Year 1 50% of Pupil Premium children passed the phonics screen but 100% of children made progress from their starting points and 75% of the children who did not pass have a SEND.

In Year 2 50% of pupil premium children passed the phonics screen. 50% of the children who did not pass have a SEND.

The result of our phonics screen show an upward trend over the past three years.

How the Impact of PPG spending will be measured (continued...)

End of KS2

There has been a significant improvement in the progress and attainment of our pupil premium children across reading, writing and maths. Last year there was a significant within school gap for the attainment of our PP v's non PP children in reading. This gap has now been closed for reading and attainment for both writing and maths for our PP children is closely in line with their peers. Similarly we have narrowed the gap between significantly between our disadvantaged children and non-disadvantaged children nationally across Reading, Writing and Maths (table 2).


